On April 28, 2020 we received notification that our collective labour actions resulted in a ratified Central Table Collective Agreement that wasn't exactly what we were after, but fended off the strips that the Conservative Government had tabled at the onset of the negotiation.

Locally our Collective Bargaining Committee along with Derek Hulse, our provincial representative, have met several times with the AMDSB Negotiating team. Our team is working diligently to achieve many of the objectives that we determined through our local bargaining survey. Negotiations are polite and productive as we have tentatively agreed to a number of items and are continuing to negotiate on other more demanding clauses.
